

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

Early Ford V-8 Law Enforcement Legacy

"Basket Case" 1949 Ford Washington State Patrol Car Restored and Back on the Road

n advertisement caught the eye of Jim Ritter, president of the newly established Seattle Metropolitan Police Museum, back in 2013, as he scanned Craigslist. The ad read, "For sale, 1949 Ford four-door sedan, former Washington State Patrol car." Always looking for additions to his museum's police car collection, Jim responded to the advertisement, calling the owner and requesting a time to look the car over.

oon Jim headed out to Westport, Washington, the vehicle's location, on the state's Pacific Coast. Upon arrival the Ford's owner, Ralph Voorhis explained to Jim that he had purchased the car four years earlier as a father and son project and hauled it home. After disassembling much of the car, he lost enthusiasm and the project fell idle. Now that he and his family were moving soon to Hawaii, Ralph needed to sell the Ford.

Ralph's garage door rolled open and Jim got a look at the old patrol car. Extremely worn and forlorn looking, Jim looked past the cracked glass, dents and surface rust. His eyes were drawn to the black and white paint job and the original Washington State Patrol emblem decals on the front doors. This 1949 Ford standard edition Fordor was a genuine Washington State Highway Patrol car. Jim immediately felt the car needed to be restored and added to the Seattle Police Museum's patrol car collection. After some negotiation with Ralph, Jim purchased the Ford for \$600.00 on behalf of the Seattle Police Museum. Jim soon returned with a few museum volunteers and a flatbed trailer. The 1949 Ford and buckets of parts and hardware were loaded up for the long trip to the museum's shop in Ellensburg, Washington, 200 miles east.

estoration Work on the 1949 Ford patrol car soon began in earnest. With volunteers offering their various skills the work progressed. The flathead V-8 engine was pulled and an engine in better shape was obtained from a 1950 Ford parts car and sent off to the rebuilders. The hood, trunk lid and doors came off and the interior was stripped out. Metal flooring was taken from the parts car replacing the rusted-out floorboards on the '49. The rocker panels were replaced, and patch panels were welded into place where needed. The bumpers and grill were removed and later replaced and NOS side stainless strips were obtained. The pitted chrome components such as the hood ornament and trunk handle and hinges were re-plated to look new.

With a new coat of black and white paint, a new interior kit, floor and trunk mats and new tires installed, the 1949 Ford Fordor Police Car looks much as it must have back in 1948 when it was first placed into service.

ooking back on the process, Jim Ritter commented "It was in amazingly good shape considering that it was a 64-year-old vehicle". Jim went on "Most police agencies that restore old cars, they are simply civilian versions they've mocked up to look like police cars. This is actually an original."

Finally the 1949 Ford Standard Fordor patrol car was unveiled to the public in May 2019, six years after the restoration began. It was the most extensive restoration the Seattle Police Museum ever attempted. Washington State Patrol Chief, John R. Batiste was on hand for the event. The guest of honor however was retired Washington State Trooper Fred Schenk, age 93, who had served as a Washington State Trooper and State Patrol Sergeant from 1947-1976.

rooper Schenk recalled being issued a new 1949 Ford patrol car after his 1947 Ford panel truck patrol vehicle was replaced. The retired Trooper recalled making runs in his overdrive equipped 1949 Ford patrol car at over 100 miles per hour. He also remembered how the car would slide on icy mountain roads during winter months. The 1949 Fords were in use from 1948-1952 and were sold at auction after being taken out of service. Service stickers found on this Ford indicate that the patrol car was used in the Ellensburg area, where the restoration was done.

The Washington State Patrol has an interesting history which goes back further than most State Police agencies. The agency was founded June 8, 1921 as the Washington State Highway Patrol. Six highway patrolmen were hired and they were issued Indian motorcycles. With limited police powers, the patrolmen were sent out onto state highways to enforce traffic laws and ensure driver safety.

otorcycle patrol proved dangerous. In 1923 Patrolman Vernon Fortin became the first officer killed in the line of duty when his police motorcycle collided with another patrolman's motorcycle as they proceeded to a traffic detail. Motorcycle accidents took the life of a patrolman in 1926, two in 1929 and one in 1930.

In 1927 a Model "T" Ford panel truck was acquired by the Highway Patrol and it's driver was assigned to patrol the mountain highway at Snoqualmie Pass. In the years ahead the agency would often utilize Ford panel trucks on patrol, affording lots of storage space for equipment and room to safely transport prisoners and arrestees.

With the dawning of the 1930's the Washington Legislature responded to the brand new challenges that decade brought by reorganizing the state police agency, renaming it "The Washington State Patrol" in 1933. Officers were given full police powers throughout the state and took on a higher profile. In 1937 the patrolmen were given new blue uniforms and bow ties, which were not blown about on motorcycle duty.

The Washington State Patrol relied on Ford V-8s for patrol purposes during the nineteen thirties and forties. The department favored two passenger coupes and panel trucks. Vehicles received two way radios in 1943. A transition was made to four door sedans in 1948 when the new 1949 Ford models became available and this body style has been used ever since.

Pack in 1963 the Washington State Patrol began calling their officers "Troopers". Over the years the State Patrol has distinguished itself in many areas. The restored 1949 Ford patrol car is a great remembrance of the Washington State Patrol's proud histroy. The car continues in circulation appearing at multiple events. The vintage patrol car was recently showcased at the Lemay America's Car Museum, in Tacoma, offering an insight to younger generations of an earlier era.

t eighty years old our 1940 Ford Deluxe Fordor is looking great and has been a lot of fun for our family over the years. I do not know how many owners our car has had, but I know the first owner of my 1940 Ford Fordor was a woman who lived in Wichita Kansas. I know this because to this day, the tax stamp she had to buy after purchasing the car in 1940 is still attached to my sun visor.

The car was purchased in California by the company where I was employed. The company president and I loved old cars, so in 1993, we bought the car from someone in the Golden State. The president always went to Florida during the winter months and the car was shipped to Ft. Lauderdale and back home to Palatine in the spring. After a couple of years his interest in the car fell off and it became my responsibility. I then took care of maintenance, repairs, and storage in winter for the 1940 Ford. After a few more years, after I had a considerable financial investment in the car, it was transferred into my name.

hen the original 01A V-8 engine grew tired, I replaced it with a freshly rebuilt 1945 Flathead V-8 from Motor City Flathead in Dundee, Michigan. The car originally was Sahara Sand, but was painted Garnet Maroon in 1995. I knew nothing about the 1940 Ford Deluxe's stock configuration, so when the car was painted, the dash and window trims were also painted red instead of the correct wood grain colors. At my wife Arlene's suggestion,

our car quickly took on the nickname of "Humphrey" after the famous actor Humphrey Bogart of that era.

hile our 1940 Ford Deluxe Fordor has generally been reliable we have had an occasional problem. During one trip to the Rockford Airport with the club years back, the car blew a head gasket on the highway. Thankfully, fellow member Lloyd Duzell was along, and he gave me some copper solution for the gasket to get me back home. Later that year, Lloyd and I installed a completely new wiring harness for the Ford. Driving the 1940 Ford to the Detroit National meet in 2005, one of my water pumps sprang a leak at the last toll booth in Illinois. I had to be towed home where I picked up my modern car to rejoin the group in Detroit.

he car was used in a few weddings, including our granddaughter Erin's in 2014, which the photographers loved. Our 1940 Ford was also used in the 2006 Clint Eastwood movie "Flags of our Fathers". Having our car as part of that film was a great experience. Our Deluxe Fordor has won many trophies but the one I remember most was at a car show at Gary Lang Chevrolet, up in McHenry. Fords were a rarity at that show. Much to my surprise "Humphrey" won best in show over all those Chevrolets. It turned out that the owner of the dealership was the sole judge for the best in show award and his first car happened to have been a 1940 Ford.

So unfortunately our 1940 Ford "Humphrey" is quarantined until COVID-19 restrictions are lifted.




All tickets already sold have been entered into the drawing.
