# Coast to Coast, from One 1939 World's Fair To Another and Back in Henry's 27 Millionth Ford

As we celebrate the 85th Anniversary of the 1939 Ford and the introduction of the Mercury, it's fun to look back on this unusual

account of Ford's 27 Millionth production vehicle, a 1939 Ford Deluxe Tudor and its participation in two World's Fairs and cross-country journey through America

A thump was heard as the tudor's body was lowered onto the vehicle's chassis on Wednesday, February 15, 1939. The body was bolted to the frame and soon, assembly of the automobile was complete. The normal din of the Richmond California Ford Assembly plant fell into silence and all activity on the line came to a halt. This newly completed 1939 Ford Deluxe Tudor was not just any new Ford but the 27 millionth production Ford Automobile. It had been the unbroken custom that Millionth milestone Fords were produced in Dearborn in the past but this time the honor fell to the to the bay area Richmond plant due to its close proximity to the Golden Gate International Exposition, the west coast 1939 World's Fair, held on San Francisco's Treasure Island.

The first person to slide behind the wheel of this milestone Ford was Leland Cutler, president of the Golden Gate Exposition. Cutler had the honor of driving the new Deluxe Tudor off of the assembly line

and parking it in front of the Richmond California assembly plant, beside the 10 Millionth Ford, a Model "T". On opening day, Saturday February 18th, the 27 Millionth Ford was driven to the Golden Gate International Exposition by Percy Stanford, president of the Richmond Chamber of Commerce, and veteran Ford Executive Frank Vivian. The Deluxe Tudor arrived at the Ford Pavilion on Ford Day at the Fair, where it held the place of honor at a luncheon officiated by the Ford executives pictured. At least 75 newspaper, radio, magazine, and advertising personnel were in attendance at the luncheon, which provided extensive media coverage of the event. The fair's theme was "Pageant of the Pacific" and celebrated the recent completion of the Oakland Bay Bridge (1936) and the Golden Gate Bridge (1937).

After one week at the Golden Gate Exposition the 27 Millionth Ford departed the Exposition on May 28, 1939. The Ford hit the highway east bound with its destination the New York World's Fair which had opened April 30th on what was once a marsh in Flushing Meadows, east of New York City. Taking the wheel was Ford executive Jim Rooney accompanied by Jack Doyle of the Richmond Ford Branch. The milestone Ford left on its journey in a convoy of about ten other new Fords and a Highway Patrol escort. Before leaving California, the 27 Millionth Ford was bedecked with California license plate number 27,000,000 as a gift from the Governor.

As the interstate journey continued, each state Governor acted in kind as the Ford passed through. Besides California, the states of Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana,

Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York awarded license plates on the journey east.

The 27 Millionth Ford and accompanying escort vehicles made many scheduled stops, generally pausing for a brief ceremony at Ford Dealerships along the route. The convoy was generally greeted by the mayor, Chamber of Commerce Representative and the owner of the local Ford dealership. Each stop normally received a write up in the local newspaper.

On June 16, 1939, after nineteen days on the road the 27th Million Ford pulled in to the "World of Tomorrow" as the New York World's Fair was called. It was Ford Day of course and the arrival coincided with the 36th Anniversary of the founding of Ford Motor



Company. Henry and Edsel Ford were on hand to greet the arriving procession. Both beamed with pride at the appearance of the shiny Deluxe Tudor. Henry Ford gave an enthusiastic speech on the significance of World's Fairs, mentioning that a gasoline powered pump he had seen on display at the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago inspired him to produce a gasoline engine "light enough to fit on a carriage, but strong enough to pull it."



Visitors to the Ford exhibit first entered the main hall decorated with a huge "moving mural" depicting a working V-8 engine. Sightseers passed a lineup of current models beside the 27 Millionth Ford including a 1939 Standard Ford, Ford Deluxe, Mercury, Lincoln Zephyr and Lincoln. Also displayed were Henry Ford's first gasoline engine, his 1896 Quadracycle, and several early Ford cars, described as "pioneers of the roadways of yesteryear". As part of Ford's industrial exhibit there was a round revolving display showing the steps taken in manufacture of a Ford car, called "The Ford Cycle of Production". Fair goers even got a chance to ride in a new Ford over a system of ramps running through the 7 acre Ford exhibit.

The 27th Million Ford's mission was not yet complete however. On Tuesday July 11, 1939, the Tu-

dor began its westward trek back to San Francisco. On the journey back a stop was made in Washington D.C. where President Franklin Roosevelt signed its log book. Other stops on the way west were made at Baltimore, MD, Philadelphia and Pittsburg, PA, Louisville, KY, St. Louis and Kansas City, MO, Dallas, Ft. Worth, and El Paso, TX, Oklahoma City, OK, Phoenix, AZ, and Los Angeles and Fresno CA. The 27 Millionth Ford returned to its place of distinction at San Francisco's Golden Gate Exposition, retaining its honored status until the 37 Millionth Ford took its place at the Fair in 1940, but that's a story for another time.

- 62% of American are stressed about WORK, according to the American Psychological Association. Eating 1.4 ounces of DARK CHOCOLATE EVERY DAY for two weeks was shown to reduce stress.

  (Granted, the 30-person study was done by researchers at Nestlé.)
- According to a psychological survey done in 1938 and again in 2007, anxiety and mental-health issues are 5 TIMES more common now among high-school and college students than they were toward the end of the GREAT DEPRESSION.
- TWO-THIRDS of spoken curse words are a result of stress. Swearing accounts for 80 of the 15,000 words typically spoken per person per day.


#### FROM THE EDITORS

We want to say "Thank You" to Scott, Este, Ron and everyone








#### **Ghost Car**
